

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## INCOME TAX ON ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS.

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The Honorary Treasurer desires to call attention to a provision in the Finance Acts which enables hospitals to recover Income Tax on their annual subscriptions where subscribers enter into an Agreement to continue their subscriptions for not less than seven years.

With Income Tax at 4/- in the £, this concession is equivalent to a 25 per cent. increase on the subscription, although the subscriber pays no more than formerly. On a subscription of £1 the Hospital can recover 5/- ; on £4 the Hospital recovers £1, and so on. The Honorary Treasurer will be very grateful if subscribers will sign the form of Agreement.



For the information of those into whose hands this Report may fall, it may be stated that the LONDON TEMPERANCE HOSPITAL was founded in 1873 for the Medical and Surgical treatment of the sick without recourse to the ordinary administration of alcohol. It was, at the same time, provided that the Medical Staff should be at liberty to administer alcohol when they deemed it needful, every such case to be recorded, and published in the succeeding Annual Report. During the fifty-five years of the Hospital's existence there have been 221 such cases in a total of 53,196 In-Patients.\*

As a GENERAL HOSPITAL, this Institution has a strong claim upon all benevolent persons, while its distinctive principle serves as a protection from those perils which attend the administration of alcohol, even for Medicinal objects.





# Report of the Board of Management for 1928,

*With the Financial Statement and Official Statistics  
for the Year ended December 31st, 1928.*

The Board of Management have the honour to submit to the Governors and Subscribers their Report for the year 1928, together with the Audited Accounts.

*In-patients.*—In so far as In-patients are concerned, the demands upon the Hospital have exceeded those of any previous year, a daily average of 114 being recorded throughout the year, the 1,468 cases treated to a conclusion being classified into Medical 578, and Surgical 890, while the average length of stay of each patient was 28½ days.

*Out-patients.*—The number of Out-patients and Casualties treated were :—

The voluntary gifts, which aggregated about 25 per cent. of the total expenditure, show a small decrease upon those of 1927. This is due to a falling off in annual subscriptions, consequently partly, they regret to note, on account of the death of some regular supporters, while others have, owing to their circumstances, expressed their inability to continue their support. New subscribers have, however, been enlisted, but these have not made up for the deficiency. It should be noted that many donations accrue regularly by means of annual collections from Societies, earmarked thus. To form a true comparison, therefore, it is desirable to include donations with subscriptions. Upon this basis, the years 1927 and 1928 compare as follows :—

The Board, therefore, urge the necessity of a much larger subscription list, and appeal not only to all charitably disposed, but to those who may at any time have benefited by treatment received in the past, to augment the regular income, by becoming subscribers to the General Funds, or, if already subscribers, by adding to the amount they kindly contribute, and of impressing the needs of the Hospital upon their friends.

The Board are grateful to the Central Funds for their welcome assistance which, it is satisfactory to note, shows an increase of £773 on the 1927 Awards. The amounts received were :—

They also acknowledge, with gratitude, the successful efforts of the North-West London Hospital Society, who contributed by means of box collections in the district, and from patients' visitors altogether £192. This is an appreciable increase on the previous year's collection. They desire also cordially to thank the individual collectors for their sacrificing labours.

Under the heading of Legacies, the Board have been fortunate in receiving £4,660 during the year. It was necessary, however, as in previous years, to place the whole of this amount to the General Fund towards meeting the ordinary expenditure, a position which causes great anxiety to the Board, but which could not be avoided owing to the position of the bank Overdraft.

Thanks are due to Miss E. Lamb, M.B.E., whose Entertainments raised £65 from various branches of the N.B.W.T.A.U. and many Schools, and to all who kindly arranged for these

entertainments to be held. The Board express their grateful appreciation to Miss Lamb for this useful means of raising money and giving publicity to the Hospital (see page 73).

The Board desire to tender their cordial thanks to the many donors who have sent valued gifts during the year; notably flowers, fruit and eggs; all greatly appreciated by the patients. Also for the welcome toys and other gifts which have delighted the children.

The many Theatre tickets received during the year are greatly appreciated, and the Board extend their thanks to the Managers for offering this welcome means of recreation to the Staff.

They are much indebted also to the local Clergy and Ministers for their ministrations to the patients, and to those Charities, Organisations and Relief Committees for their welcome assistance to the patients during the year.

*Tin Foil.*—The collections of tin foil have been most welcome, the results of the sale of which have been very gratifying, and the Board would urge readers to note their desire for all kinds of tin foil, which is greatly valued as a means of raising money.

*Patients' Contributions.*—An increasingly important feature in the ordinary income is the amount received from patients and their societies towards the cost of maintenance, which, altogether, amounted to £6,523. Of this amount, £1,059 accrued from the Hospital Saving Association, and £613 from the London Midland and Scottish Railway Hospital Fund, while the voluntary payments by patients amounted to £3,087.

*Private Patients.*—An interesting item included under this heading is the receipts from patients occupying the private rooms, now at the disposal of members of the middle-classes desiring first-class Nursing Home treatment at a moderate fee. During the year 50 such patients were treated, an average of four out of the five rooms available being occupied throughout the year. These fees amounted to £1,363.

Expenditure.—In comparing the principal items of expenditure with those of the year 1927, the Board beg to submit the following figures :—

The total expenditure for 1928 amounted to £25,771, and exceeded the total income by £1,594.

Under the heading of Salaries, Wages, and Administration, they desire to point out that an increase has occurred which is due chiefly to the adoption of the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers, a scheme approved and supported by King Edward's Hospital Fund, which came into operation as from 1st January, 1928. Entry for existing nurses and officers was optional, but after that date it is compulsory for all sisters, staff nurses, and officers entering the Hospital service. The basis of the scheme is that the Hospital contributes 10 per cent. of the salary and emoluments, and the nurse or officer concerned 5 per cent. The Board felt that in adopting this arrangement, in common with the majority of London and Provincial Hospitals, they were well advised.

**Apart from these items it is satisfactory to note that a general decrease in expenditure has occurred despite a larger average number of Patients and Staff being in residence.**

The Board feel that this is largely due to the efficient management of the Hospital by its Staff, whom they desire cordially to congratulate.

During the year it was necessary to redecorate certain portions of the Main Building, which were in too bad a condition for the matter to be postponed. This work was undertaken at a cost of £176.

**The Board once again desire to express their great anxiety and concern consequent upon the position of the Bank Overdraft still remaining about the same as last year.** To reduce expenses is practically impossible, unless some of the Wards are closed down, or the standard of efficiency reduced. They, therefore, appeal to their supporters to come forward and assist in removing this heavy burden of £19,392, £10,000 of which was expended upon vital improvements carried out during 1925.

Until this is accomplished, the task of meeting the annual maintenance bill will be difficult. The Board, therefore, plead urgently for special consideration to wipe out the overdraft.

*Average Cost per Patient.*—The cost of Patients based upon the foregoing expenditure will here be of interest compared with the previous year :—

The Board desire to draw attention to the fact that the decrease in the cost of the In-patients is due to the larger average number of patients resident, as well as to the reduction of expenditure, while the Out-patient figures are slightly higher, owing to a lower average number of patients; the overhead charges remaining similar to those of 1927.

*Special Expenditure.*—An amount of £480 appearing on the Balance Sheet under Equipment, represents the sum of £327 expended on the furnishing of the Mornington Crescent

Nursing Staff Annexe at the commencement of the year ; while an Orthoscope for gastro-intestinal examinations, (costing £153), which the Medical Staff urgently needed owing to the lack of such apparatus in the X-Ray Department was charged under this heading.

*President.*—The Board record with keen satisfaction the election of Sir H. Percy Shepherd, C.C., as President, in March last, and take this opportunity of expressing their sincere gratitude to him for the deep personal interest he has taken in the welfare of the Hospital and his valued support rendered during the year.

*Board of Management.*—The Board also have pleasure in recording that Mr. H. S. Syrett, C.B.E., LL.B., C.C., was elected a Member of the Board during the year. Mr. Syrett, a life governor, has evinced his great sympathy by his active co-operation on behalf of the funds. In July last he was elected Chairman of the Appeal Committee. His difficult task of helping to remove the large deficit, and raising the additional income, will be fully realised, and the Board feel that all their supporters will do the utmost to co-operate with him in this respect.

*Obituary.*—The Board deeply regret to announce the deaths of many valued friends, notably that of the Most Hon. the Marquis of Lincolnshire, a former President and patron, while an old friend and patron has been lost by the decease of Mr. J. Turner Rae.

By the death of Mr. John Newberry, they have lost a valued patron and supporter. The Hospital is included among those Charities which will benefit by his will.

The loss sustained in the death of Mrs. E. Kidner, a staunch supporter, and member of the Ladies' Association for many years, came as a shock to her numerous friends at the Hospital, where her ministrations to the patients, carried on for many years, will be sadly missed. The Board take this opportunity of expressing their deep sense of appreciation to Mrs. Martin and Miss Swinstead for so kindly coming forward and continuing her good work in the Wards.

By the decease of Miss S. E. Orme, the Hospital has lost an old colleague and valued friend. Miss Orme was appointed Matron as far back as 1873, retiring from active service in 1898.

The Board also have to record with regret the death of Mr. William Carr, whose valued services and active participation, as a member of the Board of Management from 1919 until 1925, were given so wholeheartedly. His kindness in remembering the Hospital in his will is greatly appreciated.

*Nursing.*—During the year many changes have taken place in the personnel of the Nursing Staff.

Upon the resignation of Miss M. Willis, Assistant Matron, it was decided to discontinue the post of Sister Housekeeper, and arrangements were made for the Assistant Matron to be again in charge of the Housekeeping Department, Miss E. Littlejohn being appointed to this post.

Among the Sisters who have resigned, mention should be made of Miss F. M. Edwards, who went to New Zealand to be married. During the whole of her nursing career, a period of 15 years, she was connected with the Hospital, and always efficiently fulfilled her duties.

*Private Nursing Staff.*—The institution of a small Private Nursing Staff, decided upon late in 1927, has already proved its usefulness. Enquiries are coming in apace; until further accommodation is acquired, however, it will not be possible materially to add to the Staff, who are housed at the Mornington Crescent Annexe.

The Board desire to record their warm appreciation of the devoted services rendered by the Matron, Sisters and Nurses during the past year.

*Medical Staff.*—The Board again wish to express their thanks to the Members of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff for their valued services to the Patients throughout the year, during which a large demand has been made upon them.

The London Clinical Society, whose meetings the Board have been pleased to arrange to be held at the Hospital, have taken place at regular intervals.

The Hospital was honoured by a visit from Sir Berkeley Moynihan, who delivered the MacAlister Lecture in connection with this Society

The Board desire to tender their hearty congratulations to him on the well deserved honour of a Peerage conferred upon him.

*Ladies' Association.*—The Ladies' Association has demonstrated its great usefulness to the Hospital during the year, and the Board take this opportunity of tendering their sincere appreciation to the President of the Association, Mrs. Rigg, and her colleagues who have given unremittingly of their time in the interests of the Hospital by providing many useful articles and assisting the funds generally.

They beg to refer to the Report of the Association on page 77, where details of their gifts will be found, and hope the numbers and influence of this valued Association may be augmented.

*Fire Inspection.*—The Board wish again to thank Mr. S. F. Lea for his valued work carried out in connection with the regular fire inspections and staff drills. Mr. Lea was elected a Life Governor in May last as a token of the Board's appreciation of his services in this respect.

*Special Departments Extension Scheme.*—In conclusion, the Board are particularly desirous of again calling the attention of their supporters and others to the urgency for definite action being taken this year in regard to the Scheme for which they issued an Appeal in their last Report. On account of the relatively small response to the appeals issued during 1928, it was not found practicable to make any progress towards the completion of the plans. Owing, however, to the generosity of the President, Sir H. Percy Shepherd, who kindly allocated £1,000 from the William Shepherd Fund, and through whose energetic co-operation a considerable proportion of the £541 was received, it has been decided to make an early commencement with the Scheme.

Sir Percy has also generously offered a further £1,000 to the Building Fund conditional upon the Board raising a like sum.

In expressing their deep appreciation and thanks to those who contributed the above amounts, they would again ask their readers to note that the special object of this Extension is to provide adequate accommodation for the Pathological, Electrical, Massage and Sunlight Treatment Departments, now situated in a basement in cramped and most depressing surroundings, together with accommodation for twenty private wards for the middle classes, and additional accommodation for the Nursing Staff.

The Scheme will cost (approx.) £30,000, and in inviting the earnest co-operation of their many friends towards providing these most essential additions, the Board emphasize that when completed, the Hospital will rank as one of the most efficiently equipped Institutions in the country, a position they consider which justifies their action in going forward with this end in view, for the benefit of the sick and suffering, and to uphold the great traditions and principles of its Founders whose object to establish a model Hospital in every respect will have been realised.

The attention of subscribers and friends of the Hospital is called to a remarkable article appearing in the *Observer*, of the 24th February, of which the following is an extract:—

FROM £2 TO 3d.

At Edinburgh Hospital 40 years ago every patient cost about £2 a year for alcoholic drinks as a part of treatment. whereas the cost to-day is 3d. Perhaps the greatest factor which has contributed to the gradual elimination of alcohol from medical prescriptions in hospitals is the work of the London Temperance Hospital, which was opened in 1873. At that time 95 patients out of the 100 were placed on daily rations of alcohol in the shape of wines, spirits, or beer. The Temperance Hospital challenged that treatment as not only not helpful, but definitely harmful. Some said it was tempting Providence to commence such a hospital, because at that time alcohol was considered the royal way to health. Certain critics pointed out that the cemetery at the back of the new hospital would be most useful. In 53 years this institution treated 49,000 in-patients; of these 47,000 were cured or relieved, and in only 188 cases was alcohol prescribed—less than 4 cases per 1,000. Compared with the prevailing hospital experience, this “dry” infirmary has had the highest recovery rate and the lowest death rate.

## Exceptional Cases for 1928.

### Administration of Alcohol under Rule LXII.

#### RULE LXII.—EXCEPTIONAL CASES.

“As a special object of the Association is to discourage in the treatment of diseases the employment of alcohol, and to collect and furnish trustworthy evidence of the results of its disuse, it shall be incumbent on the prescribing Medical Officer, in any case where alcohol in any form is ordered for a patient, to enter in a book kept for that purpose the full particulars of the prescription, including the time, quantity, and reasons of its administration. The effect of the dose also shall subsequently be noted. *A record of all such cases in each year shall be included in the following Annual Report.*”

“J. A. P., aged 1 year and 5 months, admitted to Grosvenor Ward, suffering from broncho-pneumonia. The child was very ill, cyanosed and short of breath, and on the eighth day of the disease became very weak, and would not take its food. It was, therefore, given Sp. Vin. Rect. m. 15 four-hourly. From that time an improvement set in, and the child made an uninterrupted recovery. One and a half ounces was given in all.

(Signed) P. K. BYRNE.”

“D. P., aged 15 years, was admitted in May, 1928, suffering from suprarenal disease and general wasting and vomiting, her *cystolic* blood pressure being as low as 70 mm. She improved slightly on general treatment but developed double pneumonia at the end of November; as she was clearly going downhill on ordinary stimulants she was given alcohol, which was continued until 12th December when she died. In all she had 11 ounces.

(Signed) P. K. BYRNE.”

“M. C., aged 4 years, was admitted on 14th November suffering from broncho-pneumonia with severe symptoms. She showed no improvement on the usual stimulants, and was given alcohol which was continued from 29th November to 3rd December when she died. In all she had 3½ ounces of alcohol.

(Signed) P. K. BYRNE.”

“M. S., aged 57 years, was admitted to Sturge Side Ward under Mr. McClure on 2nd December, 1927, suffering from pharyngeal pouch springing from the post. aspect of lower pharynx. Operation was performed on 7th December, 1927, by Mr. McClure. She progressed fairly well for a few days—then developed a left sided pleurisy.

Subsequently she developed a pharyngeal fistula. The fistula appeared 11 days after operation and this together with the necessary restrictions in feeding contributed to her very poor nutrition. Ordinary stimulants failing and the patient refusing to take nourishment, she was placed upon brandy, two drachms four-hourly, on 12th January, 1928.

The patient, however, lapsed into definite melancholia and steadily refused to take solid food.

In spite of all that could be done she gradually weakened and died on 16th January, 1928.

Total amount of brandy used—six ounces.

“ J. B., Sturge Side Ward, admitted 23rd August, 1928. Four drachms brandy given in all between operation and death at 10 p.m. same day (23rd August, 1928). The brandy was administered following an abdomino-perineal resection of the rectum for Cancer.

(Signed) JAMES McCLURE.”

“ R. F., admitted “ A ” Ward. Two drachms brandy hourly when awake from 2nd September till death on 9th September. The brandy was given following abdomino-perineal resection of rectum for Cancer.

(Signed) JAMES McCLURE.”

“ D. G., aged 25 years, admitted to “ E ” Ward on 1st January, 1928, under Dr. E. G. B. Calvert, suffering from a severe influenzal bronchopneumonia. The man was extremely ill, cyanosed and short of breath, delirious and sleepless at night. For the first 10 days after his admission, he was treated with digitalin, oxygen, strychnine and atropine, but his condition showed no improvement. On 12th January he became restless and noisy and refused to take nourishment. He was put on brandy, 3 drachms four-hourly and two ounces hot whisky punch at night as a sleeping draught. He became quieter and less restless. He, however, gradually became weaker and more troubled in getting his breath, and on 15th January he became unconscious and died on 16th January after bringing up a little pus. Total quantity of brandy seven ounces; total quantity of whisky six ounces.

“ J. R. (aged 48 years), admitted “ E ” Ward 11th July, 1928, died 30th August, 1928. Disease: syphilitic myocarditis and aortitis. Patient was very ill with heart failure since admission. After everything had been tried to improve his condition with little or no success, it was decided to give him brandy. He had two drachms brandy six-hourly from 25th to 28th August, inclusive, with considerable relief to his delirium.

“ 6th November, 1928. A. B. (46), given one and half ounces brandy in one drachm doses just previous to death from spinal myelitis.

“ 24th October, 1928. G. B., 9 weeks old, admitted 17th October, 1928, suffering from congenital pyloric stenosis. Operated upon on 20th October, 1928. Was very collapsed following operation. Two drachms of brandy were administered by the rectum with beneficial effect.

“ 4th December, 1928. H. L., suffering from intractable Neuralgia (due to septic sinusitis) and insomnia, received 10 ounces whisky in ten days with good effect.



## Rules Relating to Governors

*(vide Articles of Association).*

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(a) The Patron, Vice-Patron, President and Vice-Presidents, Honorary Treasurers and Honorary Secretary of the Association for the time being shall be Governors.

(b) Every donor of at least one hundred guineas to the funds of the Association in one donation shall be a Governor for his life.

(c) Every donor or annual subscriber of at least one guinea to the funds of the Association shall be a Governor for the period of one year.

(d) Such member (if any) of any firm or company which may have given one hundred guineas at least to the funds of the Association in one donation as shall be nominated, in the case of a firm, in writing signed by the members of the firm, and in the case of a company by resolution of the Directors, shall be a Governor for his life.

(e) The Chairman or Treasurer for the time being of any public body, corporation, or society, which gives at least one hundred guineas to the funds of the Association in one donation, shall be a Governor so long as he shall hold that office.

(f) An executor or one of the executors named by a testator leaving a legacy of one hundred guineas or upwards to the Hospital may be elected a Governor for life.

(g) Every incumbent, minister, or other person who by means of moneys collected in his church or chapel, or by any other means, shall have given a contribution to the funds of the Association, shall be entitled to the same privileges as if he had given such contribution out of his own money.

(h) Every person whom the Board of Management may appoint as Honorary Governor for services rendered may be so appointed for his life or for any shorter period as the Board shall determine.

No person who under paragraphs (d) to (h) inclusive of the last preceding Article is eligible to be elected a Governor, whether for life or for any shorter period, shall so become until proposed and elected as such Governor by the Board of Management.

Every person who immediately before the incorporation of the Association was a Vice-President, Life Governor or an Honorary Life Governor of the unincorporated Hospital shall (if willing) be a Vice-President or Life or Honorary Life Governor of the Association, as the case may be, and every person who at the date of such incorporation was entitled by virtue of any annual subscription to be a Governor of the unincorporated Hospital for any period less than his life, shall (if willing) be a Governor of the Association for the remainder of the period during which he would have been so entitled had the Association not been incorporated.

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

*For the Year ending 31st December, 1928.*

During the past twelve months the Ladies' Association has continued to do good work, and though its progress is slow it is none the less sure.

The number of Members and Associates has considerably increased, thus enlarging the area of activity.

The Work Guild has been well attended twice a month, and is a popular means of accomplishing much work for the Hospital, as well as promoting good feeling among its members.

A Jumble Sale held in February realised a sum of £14.

Two Whist Drives, one in March and another in December, have been very successfully held, resulting in a sum of £11 and £18 2s. 3d., respectively.

In June, a Pound Day brought in £27 8s. 6d., besides a quantity of dry goods, which were given to the Hospital.

The "silver paper" collection has realised over £60, and has been equally divided between the Hospital and the Ladies' Association. A Bowl Sterilizer costing £51, has been given to the Hospital Theatre.

I should like to express my gratitude to the Matron and Staff for their unfailing courtesy and willing help at all times, and to thank all the members of the Association, especially the Treasurer and Secretary, for their loyal and valuable support.

This record of our Association testifies to our undoubted progression. We have yet a long way to go but we advance with confident and hopeful enthusiasm, always remembering, in the words of Dr. Johnson, "Few things are impossible to diligence and skill."

## The 56th Annual Public Meeting, 1929.

The 56th Annual Public Meeting of the London Temperance Hospital was held at Hampstead Road, London, N.W., on Wednesday, March 20th, 1929. Sir H. Percy Shepherd, C.C., the President of the Hospital, occupied the Chair.

### THE CHAIRMAN :

Ladies and Gentlemen, My first duty in addressing you this afternoon is to express my very deep appreciation for the honour which has been accorded me by my re-election as President of this Hospital, a position which I feel carries with it a great responsibility and one which calls for my active co-operation.

I am pleased to announce that the past year has shown an increasing demand on the Institution, which has now for 56 years carried out a glorious work for the community. This Hospital is not only a great pioneer in the cause of Temperance, having by general consent won its laurels in this respect, but it is one of the leading General Hospitals in the country, and its services are recognised by the Central Funds, who so generously have contributed towards its upkeep during the year.

The services of its medical and surgical staff are voluntarily placed at its disposal, and I would here add my humble tribute to the valued work they have undertaken during the year. I also desire to draw attention to the devoted services of the Nursing staff, whose duties are so essentially a part of the satisfactory functioning of the Hospital.

It is not my intention of dwelling too long upon details, as I shall shortly be calling upon those who have so kindly come to address you, who will be contributing their valuable quota testifying to the splendid work accomplished and in hand by the Hospital. I make it my special duty, however, to draw your urgent attention to the scheme for providing additional accommodation for the Special Departments (Pathological, Massage, Electrical and Sunlight Department) which, since I have been connected with the Hospital, I have endeavoured to assist to the best of my ability. No doubt many of you are aware of the very bad conditions under which these Departments are at present functioning. The plans, which have received the approval of the King Edward's Hospital Fund, have now been completed for enabling these and other essential additions to be placed over this Department. There is nothing to hinder the commencement of the work (the total cost of which is approx. £30,000), except to secure the goodwill of our supporters and others to assist in raising this amount. The Scheme will, in addition to the Departments I have just mentioned, include accommodation for private patients of the middle classes who are unable to afford the heavy charges of Private Nursing Homes, but able to pay from  $4\frac{1}{2}$  to 6 or 7 guineas per week. These rooms, by reason of the revenue accruing therefrom, will assist in reducing the maintenance expenses of the Hospital—an important point in view of the

present heavy deficit on the general funds ; and there is to be accommodation also for the additional Nursing staff that will be necessary, and for the nurses now forming the Private Nurses' Institute, which was commenced during 1928. I, therefore, earnestly appeal to you for your special assistance in securing this large sum as soon as possible. I have made it my business during the past year to give this scheme my wholehearted support, and although the amounts already contributed are approaching £2,000, I have made an offer of another £1,000 provided a similar sum is raised in amounts of £25 and upwards. I hope this will stimulate many to come forward so that I can place this amount at the disposal of the Board of Management. I feel confident that you will do all you possibly can to enable this valuable work to be speedily accomplished. (Cheers.)

LADY COOPER,

who was received with cheers, said : Mr. President and dear friends, this is not the first time that I have been in this Hospital. I came here some few years ago when Sir Vezey Strong was here. He was a very dear friend of mine and, you know, a most ardent worker in the Temperance cause, and I am sure it was largely owing to him that the Hospital prospered as it did. Of course you know that all Hospitals, or, rather, most of them—I do not know one that does not—have to live from hand to mouth. Perhaps this does not apply to the richly endowed Hospitals, but I know a good many of what I call the poorer Hospitals, such as the one in the Hackney Road, where it is certainly a question of hand-to-mouth existence. But we are always cheerful and peg away. I was thinking when I heard that you wanted £30,000 that, after all, it is only 6,000 times £5, and I am sure, if you only peg away and keep on and on you will get it. In this hospital work you have to keep on and on. It is no use slacking, because a hospital never shuts its doors. I always think that in what I call the great main arteries of life there are three things which are very much bound up—very much intertwined. They are the churches, for the feeding and sustenance of our souls ; the hospitals, for nursing and tending to our sick bodies ; and the schools, so that our boys and girls can be brought up to be Christian men and women. And I always say that in the disposition of your money, if you go along those three lines you will not go far wrong. They are all closely intertwined. It is the good people who have the hospitals at heart. Oh, yes they have ! Over and over again you can see it. Someone said to me the other day that hospitals should not be put down in such a slummy place as this, but that they should be moved into the country, into more healthy surroundings. It is all very well to talk like that. This Hospital, I know, is right in the middle of slums. but you cannot move the people, and if you move the Hospital you would have to move the neighbourhood with it if you are to do your work. Therefore, a hospital has to be put down in the slums like this one and like our Hackney Road Hospital, and it is a great blessing to the people. They look upon it as their own and they come along to it for the treatment of their ailments. The work in hospitals has pretty well doubled during the last twelve years

owing to the casualties which are brought in from the streets, and I was glad to see in a newspaper the other day it was suggested that some extra allowance should be made to pay for these people who are brought into the hospitals from the streets. There are numbers of them who are brought in and are treated for two or three weeks, and they go away to other districts. I know of one case at Basingstoke where the patient gave 7s. 6d. for three weeks' keep. I know it has not happened here. I was glad to notice what was said this afternoon about providing Wards for paying patients. That would be a tremendously good thing. I do not want to say a word about nursing homes, but there are numbers of them that are trying to get your money, whilst the hospitals are trying to get you well. The hospitals want your beds, but the nursing homes want your money. (Laughter.) There are numbers of poor men and women who would gladly pay £4 or £5 a week in order to be nursed in a hospital. I was four months in hospital some few years ago, and I know that the nursing in the hospitals is splendid and that they get you well. Therefore I do hope there will be a good supply of paying patients' Wards here. Then I want to say another thing. I always impress upon our young people that they and everybody ought to have a bit of work to do for the hospitals. There are plenty of ways of doing it. For instance, very often a doctor says that such and such a patient must go because he is cured. Well, perhaps he is cured, but he is not fit to leave the hospital. There is, however, such a long waiting list that patients—sometimes children—have to be sent home before they are really fit, with the result that in about another month or two, back they come again. I heard of a home at Highgate to which children who have been hospital patients are sent for a fortnight or three weeks, and they do nothing but eat and rest. That is a very good thing and often puts a patient quite right. Now, there are many people who could take a hospital patient or two into their homes for a fortnight, and that would be very valuable work. It means a little trouble, but it is a good thing if you have a spare room that you can put patients into. I understand there are various activities going on for raising money for this Hospital. There is a Ball, the tickets for which are 3s. each. I must not be premature, but I have heard there is a splendid announcement to be made presently about these Concerts and Balls. Now, I do not want to press you unduly for money, because I believe you who are here do know how to give. Sir Percy Shepherd has said that he is going to give a little more, and therefore I must see if I cannot scrape up a little more, too. (Cheers.) I hope you will forgive me for this rambling speech, but I have been doing things all day long and have not had time to prepare one. Thank you very much for listening to me.

Dr. H. B. KNIGHT-CHORLEY :

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, I feel honoured at being asked to be present to-night to take a part—a very small part—in this 56th Anniversary. I congratulate you, Sir Percy, on your re-election as President of this Institution. I am sure it is not merely an ornamental Presidency, but a

very active one and what I might call a purseful one, and that is a great thing to have in a President. Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, although we are here for the 56th Anniversary, you will excuse me if for two or three minutes I go back a few years beyond that. It was in 1867—that is going back a few years—that a few gentlemen met together to try if possible to secure a cot or bed in one of our hospitals where a patient might be treated entirely without alcohol. Well, in those early days that seemed a waste of time. The Temperance Societies had speakers going all over the country, and they were often asked, “What would you do if you were ill and the doctor ordered you alcohol?” That was a puzzle to some people, but it was never any puzzle to me because I was a teetotaler from the time I was 15, and I do not suppose I knew much about the drink before then. I have been a teetotaler up till to-day, and if I live for another 10 or 15 years I think I shall still remain a teetotaler. Now, those gentlemen met together. They were all personal friends of mine, and perhaps some of you may also remember them. There was the Rev. George McCrae, who was called the Bishop of St. Giles. There was John Hilton and Judge Payne. Then we had two splendid medical men, Dr. Edmunds, who lived then in Fitzroy Square, and Dr. Benjamin Ward Richardson. There was also the late Mr. John Mann. Those gentlemen met together in a room about a mile from this Hospital, and they decided that as it was not possible to secure a cot or a bed in a hospital where the patient could be treated entirely without alcohol, they would endeavour to start a hospital of their own. Now, at that time there were attempts made to frighten people. It was said there was such a thing as a prison and a Coroner and a Coroner’s Court, and it was asked what would happen if a man died who had been refused alcohol. That went on for a few years until 1871, and in 1871 there was a Conference held with a view to considering the formation of a Temperance Hospital. That was due to the agitation which had been going on in the Temperance Societies. That Conference was held in the Strand, and I know the names of many of those who attended it. Some of them I have mentioned already, but there were a number of other people who were well-known in the Temperance world at that time. It was a business Conference, and I remember the speeches. I have the notes of some of them. You must not think, Ladies and Gentlemen, that because I am speaking to you of those years gone by that I am an old man. I was quite a little stripling at that time. At the same time I was speaking on temperance and historical matters all over the country when I was 18 or 20 years of age, so that I was in the know, even at that time. At that Conference there was a big committee formed and that committee went to work. They had meetings and some of the Temperance people subscribed money, and then as a result of the work of that committee, in 1873, they took a big house in Gower Street, not far from here. I did not like Lady Cooper referring to this as being in the slums. I lived here for a good many years and I can tell you we are not quite in the slums. We are thickly populated, and that is why the Hospital is needed. Well,

as I say, that committee decided that they would take the house in Gower Street, and that was the commencement of the Hospital we have here to-day. They went on there for a time. I forget the number of beds, but I think it was about 12. But people ran away with the idea—and they do so to-day—that this Hospital is only for teetotalers. Well, look at the Report and see. The fact is, teetotalers do not get ill like moderate drinkers and therefore they do not require the Hospital. (Laughter.) I do not know what this Hospital would do if it had to depend entirely upon teetotalers for its patients. Well, the work has gone on from 1873 right up to 1929. You know the establishment that we have got here, having no doubt been through the Wards. A few years ago I was talking to some men who had been in this Hospital—not teetotalers, but some of them moderate drinkers and others a little beyond moderate, perhaps—and everyone of them told me—and they were both In-patients and Out-patients—what splendid treatment they received from the Medical Staff and from the Nurses, and that everything was better than they could have expected. Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, that is worth a shilling or two a year to go to the boxes, to help carry on this work. I must not detain you, because we have such good speakers here and I am only giving you a few rambling remarks. I always feel that I must go back to the beginning when I talk of these matters because I was in at that point and I did my little bit, and I have been trying to do my little bit ever since. After the Hospital removed from Gower Street the Temperance Societies came to its assistance, and particularly the Sons of Temperance and the Good Templars. The Sons of Temperance have got a cot in this Hospital in the name of William Wightman—a man who did a tremendous amount of good in the Temperance cause. He and I worked together and a great many others, but we want the young ones to come on and take the places of the old ones. We have on the platform to-night Major Rigg who, as Chairman of the Board of this Hospital, can tell you more about it than any other speaker on the platform. In conclusion, I should like to thank Mr. Adams for inviting me to come, not because I am speaking, but because it has given me the opportunity of seeing your faces, of seeing the Nurses and listening to the speeches from this platform. I very much enjoyed last year the speeches from our President, and the Bishop of Willesden, and the other gentlemen who spoke. I will close with a few lines :—

“ Let us live for those that love us,  
 Let us live for those that love us true,  
 Let us live for the Heaven above us,  
 Let us live for the good that we can do.  
 Let us live for the wrongs (of the Drink Traffic) that need  
 resistance,  
 Let us live for the good (Temperance Hospital) that needs  
 assistance,  
 Let us live for the future in the distance,  
 Let you and I live for the crown we have in view.”

(Cheers.)

## THE CHAIRMAN :

Ladies and Gentlemen, I am unable to keep the good news I have just heard from Lady Cooper any longer. She has promised to give £250 towards my appeal. (Cheers.)

## Mrs. ALFRED BROOKS :

Sir Percy Shepherd, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have been asked this afternoon to say a few words for our Ladies' Association. I daresay you all know that the hospitals of our country depend a great deal on the help they receive from these Ladies' Associations; and during the past year we, under the very able Presidency of Mrs. Rigg, have been able to provide a number of comforts and appliances that it would not have been possible to get but for the Ladies' Association. We do appeal this afternoon to all the ladies who are not members of the Association to come and help us. There are a lot of things we can do. We have a working meeting twice a month on Monday afternoons, and we come to the Hospital—those of us who can—and do mending and make new things such as bed jackets and other garments that the patient's need. We want more help, and we therefore appeal to you. If you are already members of the Association we hope you will mention it to your friends, because the Hospital does need comforts like bed jackets and other things of the same sort, which, with our big overdraft at the Bank, we would not be able otherwise to provide.

Then, might I say a few words about the Hospital. One of our speakers this afternoon has told you how it was started over 50 years ago. It was started by devoted men and it was a great adventure. They were brave men, because it was started under great opposition. Nearly all those men have passed over, but they have left the work that they started as a sacred trust to Temperance people. If we are to allow the ideals that they had to become dimmed or to sink altogether we shall fail in the trust that has been left us. We ought, therefore, to do our best to keep the flag flying. We must not let it drop, and we want your help. We can only carry on if we have your help in one way or another. Therefore, I ask you this afternoon, help us in every way you can. I wonder if some of you heard the first S.O.S. that was broadcast some three years ago. It was a Sunday evening; the rain was beating against the windows and the wind was blowing. Suddenly the music stopped and the announcer said: "I have a message. Is any listener-in living near Ampthill? If so, will you go to Mrs.— at such and such an address and ask her at once to come to the Middlesex Hospital as her son is dangerously ill and needs her." I said to my husband, "Do you think anybody will go?" and he said, "Yes, I think somebody will." We sat for five minutes and then the voice came through again, "Don't trouble about Ampthill. Major — has telephoned to say he is going from London to fetch the mother in his car." The next day the papers said that 30 cars went to Mrs. — She was able to see her son for an hour before he died. To-night the S.O.S. goes out. There are still dying people who need your help. Will you be one of the 30 to give that help? (Cheers.)

## THE CHAIRMAN :

I am now going to ask Mr. W. C. Steven, the Secretary of the Incorporated Secretaries Association, to speak.

## Mr. W. C. STEVEN :

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, there is a saying in Scotland—I do not know whether you have it in England—that “the proof of the pudding is in the preenin’ o’t.” I can use this expression very aptly to-night, because for a month at the end of last year I happened to be an out-patient of this Hospital. I had rather a bad knee and I came up here for a small operation, and I attended every morning afterwards for a month to have the knee dressed. I can, therefore, speak from personal experience of the most excellent services which the Hospital renders, and I desire to pay a very high tribute to the Doctor and the Nurse—Sister Smith—who very kindly looked after me.

Now I should like to know what we can do to help forward the work of this splendid Institution. There are many ways, I imagine, in which help can be given. Obviously financial assistance would be very valuable, but we can also help with our sympathy and by influencing our friends to take an active interest, financially and otherwise.

I represent a large professional Association, the President of which is Major Rigg—an Association consisting of about 2,700 members—Mr. Adams being one—and over 1,700 young people who are studying for a secretarial career—and all the members of that Association have this Hospital very much at heart. The Council issued an appeal for the Hospital in the Journal of the Association in January last, and I can assure you of the sympathy of all the members. We shall do all we possibly can if you will be good enough to let us know in what direction help is most needed. (Applause.)

Mr. H. J. PATERSON, C.B.E., M.A., M.D. (Cantab.), F.R.C.S., said : Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, my part in these proceedings is a very short but pleasant one, and that is to pass the thanks of my colleagues and myself to those who have helped us during the past year—to the Residents, to the Matron, to the Sisters, to the Nursing Staff, to Mr. Maeduff, and last, but not least, to the Secretary and his Staff. (Cheers.) We are exceptionally well served by our Residents at the present time and we owe much to them for their unremitting attention to their duties. The Matron, you all know, is always to be found in her office. The difficulty is to get her out of it ; but I am glad to say she has shown a little improvement during the last year, as I found her absent from the Hospital on at least two occasions. (Laughter.) I need not say anything about the Sisters and Nurses. They have already been mentioned and you have only to look at them this afternoon in their nice clean aprons and caps to realise that they are about as near angels as anything can be on this planet. (Cheers.) I never stand on this platform without feeling what has been so well expressed by Mrs. Brooks—my admiration at the

wisdom, foresight and courage of those who founded this Hospital. It is indeed a sacred trust, but I fear perhaps there is a danger that we may not be living up to those ideals when I read of so many exceptional cases in this Report of last year. I confess I do not like to read of these exceptional cases, because I am not one of those people who believe that alcohol is a stimulant, and the mere fact that these cases are recorded would seem to give the impression that this Hospital regards alcohol as a stimulant. It is not a stimulant, it is a narcotic; and when I see it prescribed it always reminds me of the story of the girl who said that pins had saved a multitude of lives. Her teacher asked how that could be, and she replied, "By not a-swallowing of them." (Laughter.) Alcohol has saved many lives—by not swallowing it. I am quite certain more lives have been saved by not swallowing alcohol than have ever been saved by the administration of it. (Cheers.) I may say that none of my patients have suffered from that danger, because during the 28 years I have been associated with this Hospital I have never had occasion, either here or in my private practice, to prescribe alcohol for any of my patients; and I do feel it is very desirable that everyone who works in this Hospital, in whatever capacity, should be in full sympathy with the aims and ideals of the Hospital. (Hear, hear.) Unless that is so I think there is a danger that our influence for good may be lost. It is a source of extreme pleasure to us all that our President has taken up so actively the building of the additions to this hall. I remember the first time I spoke at one of these annual meetings—I think it was in 1906—I emphasised the need for a Pathological Department. We are still waiting for it, but our President hopes to get it for us very soon. It was an urgent need then, it is a still more urgent need now. This hall in which we are meeting this afternoon is, I think, a monument of the evils of procrastination. At the time it was built in 1907, we could have completed the three stories for about £8,000, and it will now cost us some £24,000. But our President is not a pessimist; he is an optimist, and we all hope that under his stimulating leadership the Board will soon see their way to commence the new building.

In conclusion, it is my pleasing duty to thank the Governors for the vote of thanks they passed to us this afternoon. I can assure you, Sir, no vote of thanks is really needed, but we do appreciate that vote. We appreciate that you appreciate our services, and we shall hope to continue to merit that approval in the future. (Cheers.)

MAJOR RICHARD RIGG, O.B.E., T.D., J.P., B.A. (Cantab.):  
Ladies and Gentlemen, I have a very pleasing duty to perform, and that is, as your mouthpiece, to express the deep debt of gratitude we owe to Sir Percy Shepherd for presiding and to the Ladies and Gentlemen who have delighted us with their eloquence this afternoon. I think we have indeed been very fortunate in our various speakers at this annual public meeting. They have dealt with our question from different standpoints. It was indeed a fortunate day for the London Temperance Hospital when we enlisted the sympathy and support of that Lady—that Queen of bounty

and benevolence in the City—Lady Cooper, whose heart has ever gone out in deep and earnest sympathy to suffering humanity. (Cheers.) She has in her day and generation championed many worthy causes, but I can assure her there is no cause which has given forth, in the days that are gone, more unselfish and willing service than this Hospital, which has in days gone by enlisted the sympathy of men and women to work on our behalf. We have in Mr. H. B. Knight-Chorley one of the pioneers—one of the men who possess a faith that would almost remove mountains—who, in the teeth of opposition from the clergy and the medical profession, against the overwhelming influence of the public Press, was never shaken. In those days he championed our cause, and to-day, after a lapse of some 62 years—for we cannot forget that it was in the year 1867 that he initiated this great movement—he sees an Institution which is efficient and effectively functioning as a good general Hospital, but none the less an Institution which, throughout its 56 years of existence, has done splendid pioneer work in the cause of Temperance Reform. We have brought into line all the great general Hospitals of London by our teaching and pioneer work, and to-day they are slowly yet surely becoming Temperance Hospitals and reducing the consumption of alcohol to a minimum. I am entirely in agreement with the words which fell from Mr. Paterson. I want to see these exceptional cases fall still lower; but at the same time we must admit that this Hospital is much larger than it was in those early days. We have close upon 140 beds; and if we will only safeguard our interests as a Temperance Institution and see to it that these exceptional cases are reduced to a minimum, I think it will not be a bad record that, in a period of something like 55 years, out of some 53,000 cases of In-patients dealt with, 51,000 have been cured or relieved, and only in something like 200 cases has alcohol been prescribed (Cheers), whilst our record is in every sense a very remarkable one. I take this opportunity of tendering to Mr. Paterson our best thanks for the loyal way in which, both by his medical practice and the exercise of his literary ability, he has done a great deal to show the inutility of alcohol so far as the treatment of disease is concerned. We are deeply grateful to Mrs. Brooks, a member of our Board, for having come here to-day at some considerable inconvenience. She is another doughty champion in the Temperance cause. She has never been ashamed to nail her colours to the mast, and her great influence on the women's side of total abstinence work has been most invaluable to this Hospital. I tender to her our sincere thanks. Then we have had the genial and breezy Scotsman, Mr. W. C. Steven, and he brought a human touch to this gathering. An ounce of practice is worth a ton of theory, and Mr. Steven to-day will go forward, an energetic and stalwart worker in the interest of the London Temperance Hospital. We are grateful to him for having promised the valuable assistance of his own important organisation for the cause we have at heart. I have the utmost pleasure in proposing that our best thanks be accorded to the Chairman and speakers. To you, Mr. Chairman, we are deeply indebted for the

veritable revolution which, I venture to say, during the past 12 months you have effected so far as this Institution is concerned. You have given us the endowment of a wonderful hope, the cheery spirit of optimism to go forward in the future and work for this Hospital, and you have not been behindhand in generously responding to the appeals for this Institution. When we have reached our goal which we have in view, when we have raised that £30,000—and we shall raise that money—we shall realise the value of that cheery spirit of optimism. We are starting out with the goodwill of the King's Fund, who have approved our scheme. We are starting out on a work which is urgently needed. We must not lose sight of the fact, however, that, so far as our main building is concerned, our Hospital is thoroughly efficient and has been fully commended by the King's Fund. But we have to-day in the basement of this very Out-patients' Department, a Pathological, Massage, Electrical and Sunlight Department, which are functioning under very unsatisfactory conditions. Those Departments are not a credit to any Institution and it is up to us, in the interests of the self-sacrificing workers in this Hospital, to see to it that they are housed under better conditions. I look forward to seeing the satisfactory completion of this scheme which Sir Percy Shepherd has so sincerely fathered. I should like to thank the members of the Ladies' Association for the great assistance they have rendered. As Chairman of the Board I thank my colleagues for their most loyal support, and to Mr. Adams I should like to say how deeply grateful I am for his very loyal and consistent help. (Cheers.) Mr. Adams is not a man who comes much into the limelight, but he does thoroughly sound, sincere, honest and conscientious work behind the scenes, and I, for one, am very grateful to him and very proud of my association with him in the work of this Institution. I should also like to thank our Almoner, Miss Willman, for the wonderful accession of financial strength we have received from the voluntary payments of patients. That has entered upon a wonderful career of success, and I think it is one of the most hopeful avenues of income for this Institution. To all those who have helped to advance the best interests of the Hospital I should like to tender our best thanks. I have very much pleasure in proposing a vote of thanks to our Chairman and speakers to-day.


Mr. ROBERT A. PENNEY, J.P. :

I am delighted to add a word or two in support of the vote of thanks so ably moved by our worthy Chairman, Major Rigg. We are very much indebted to him—almost more to him than to anyone else—for his work in many ways in connection with the services of this Hospital. A good deal has been said to you about the need of spending £30,000 on the premises here, in all of which I entirely unite; but I would like to mention the other need as well. Perhaps, as Treasurer, I must notice the current needs more than the capital requirements, if we are to bring this Institution up to the pitch of usefulness we really wish it to reach. You will see from the Annual Balance Sheet that we owe our bankers about £20,000. Our annual

expenditure is about £25,000, so that we are getting every year behind-hand in the overdraft we owe our Bankers. In addition to that, we have tradesmen's and other bills owing at the end of the year of over £3,000, making a total of about £28,000 which we really need for current expenditure. Much as I like the gifts coming in for this capital expenditure—which is necessary, and which I regard not simply as an expense, but, keeping in mind the paying patients as a source of income, so that it is a thoroughly helpful outlook in that way—yet it would delight my heart if we could reduce that large sum owing to our Bankers, the interest on which is such a very heavy burden on our funds. So, in looking to the future capital to be raised, also remember please the great need we have to meet our current expenditure. We were not quite so badly off in meeting current expenditure last year as the year before, but we are nearly £1,400 down on the year, making an accumulated deficit of about £7,000 in not meeting the various needs of the year up to date. You will see we are not in a very flourishing financial position, and I do think that when expressing our testimony to all the officials who do so well it is incumbent upon us to see that the Institution is carried on with efficiency. I heartily support the vote of thanks which has been moved by Major Rigg.

MAJOR RICHARD RIGG, O.B.E., T.D., J.P., B.A. (Cantab.):

Before putting that vote of thanks, I think we should all like to congratulate our President on the wonderful success which attended the Concert given under the auspices of the St. Bartholomew Club, of which Sir Percy Shepherd is the President. As a result of that Concert last night—I believe I am correct in stating—a sum of well over £500 will accrue to the funds of the London Temperance Hospital. (Cheers.)

The vote of thanks was put to the meeting and carried with acclamation.

THE CHAIRMAN:

Major Rigg, Ladies and Gentlemen, first of all I thank you very much indeed for the flattering words Major Rigg has said about me and also you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for the way you have received them. As I said in my opening remarks, I will do what I can for the Hospital, and we hope to see this new building up very soon. (Cheers.)
